4-H ATV SAFETY COURSE ROLLS INTO CANTINE FIELD IN SAUGERTIES

Cornell Cooperative Extension of Ulster County 4-H Youth Development Program will offer youth and parents the opportunity to learn more about all terrain vehicles (ATV) safety thanks to a grant awarded by National 4-H Council as part of the 4-H ATV Safety Grant Program, a collaboration among local 4-H Programs, the national 4-H Youth Development Program and the ATV Safety Institute (ASI).

The courses will take place at Cantine Field in Saugerties beginning on Tuesday, October 2 through Thursday, October 4 from 3:00pm 5:00pm and Friday, October 5 from 3:00pm 6:00pm. Youth from ages 10-17 must pre-register no later than Friday, September 28. Space is limited to 25 youths, based on a paid first come, first serve basis. The fee is \$10. This ATV Safety course is in cooperation with CCEUC, 4-H ATV Safety Grant Program, Saugerties Police Department, Local ATV Dealers, and SAGE

There has been a substantial increase of ATV riders over the last 10 years locally and nationally. There are many riders in our area, and this course will help to educate them, which in turn can help prevent accidents from happening said Dave Rothe, Youth Coordinator.

Cornell Cooperative Extension of Ulster County 4-H Youth Development is one of 21 4-H Programs in 13 states nationwide to receive a 4-H ATV Safety Grant in 2007. Three youths and four adults from Cornell Cooperative Extension in Ulster Countys 4-H Youth Program will also attend a national 4-H ATV Safety training.

4-H ATV Safety - sponsored by ASI - builds awareness for safe riding practices as the popularity of all-terrain vehicles continues to rise in the United States. The program brings awareness to kids and parents about the risks of riding an ATV and how to avoid injury by wearing the proper safety gear, determining safer places to ride, and making sure the ATV is the proper size for its rider. 4-H ATV Safety strongly encourages youth and adults to complete a four hour ASI Rider Course and any state certification requirements before they ride an ATV. The ASI Rider Course certifies that participants have taken an ATV safety course; it does not certify them to become hands-on ATV safety riding instructors.
